Nevada special interests including **gaming**, **slot route operators**, **bar owners**, **convenience store and gas station owners**, **and tobacco lobbyists** want to gamble with your health. They say **Question 4** will protect children from secondhand smoke. Don't be fooled! The only one to benefit from this measure is **Big Tobacco**. Here are four of the many reasons to vote **NO on Question 4**.

- Why should you trust them? These special interests are hardly leaders in public health policy. In fact, a Las Vegas Review-Journal columnist called this "the smoker's initiative," adding that it "clearly won't offer much widespread protection from secondhand smoke."
- Question 4 does not protect children. It allows smoking in licensed child care facilities that care for fewer than 13 children. It also permits smoking in private homes that are used as child care facilities.
- It hurts schools. Smoking would be allowed in schools. Question 4 also repeals state law that lets school districts adopt tougher regulations, placing power solely with the Nevada State Legislature.
- Restaurants will not be smoke-free. In fact, some restaurants won't even be required to offer non-smoking sections. And if there's even one gaming device, smoking will be allowed anywhere in that restaurant. Smoking will also be allowed in all casino restaurants.

Again, consider the source. Who are you going to believe? Question 4 promises more than it can deliver. For example, Nevada law already prohibits smoking in hospitals and medical offices and allows smoking in areas of grocery stores, drug stores and convenience stores. Question 4 simply restates the law. Look beyond the smokescreen of the gaming and tobacco industries. They deny the research on secondhand smoke, yet expect you to believe they can protect you from the health risks. Don't believe it!
